



A BESPOKE CURRICULUM FOR THE NEXT GENERATION

In 2023, YMCA Black Country Group developed our own bespoke, high quality curriculum, which provides children with opportunities to explore a range of concepts, as well as allowing them to belong, contribute and thrive.

We are continuing to build our curriculum further, by developing our outdoor provision across our nurseries, with our Forest School Leader planning a range of outdoor learning opportunities.

nurseries had achieved either a GOOD or an OUTSTANDING Ofsted judgement. These achievements are down to a dedicated and hard-working staff team, who show care and compassion in their work every day. These are the values that run through all aspects of our work and to read the report and have it echoed back to us from a third party, gives us enormous pride in our team.

When developing our YMCA curriculum, our mission was to provide activities that are interesting, engaging, ambitious and inclusive. We want our

children to be inquisitive, curious, independent learners with a lifelong love of learning. One of the stand out comments from YMCA Pelsall Lane Nursery's report said "Children arrive eager to start their day and quickly immerse themselves in their chosen play. Staff help children to develop a 'can-do' attitude and enjoy learning new skills." To have our mission evidenced in that report is encouraging and we continue to develop our nursery settings to create positive outcomes and support our children and their families to flourish.

GROWING OUR OWN TALENT THROUGH EARLY YEARS APPRENTICESHIPS

One of the benefits of being part of a National YMCA movement is the chance to combine our strengths with other YMCAs and collaborate to provide the best support we can to our community.

In September 2023, as part of efforts to address recruitment

issues in the Years early years sector, YMCA Black Country in collaboration with Central YMCA, launched an Apprenticeship Academy at our nursery in Carters Green, West Bromwich, to inspire the next generation of early years educators, investing in local young people to grow our own talent.

With our specific expertise and bespoke YMCA curriculum, combined with Central YMCA's training knowledge, the Academy provides aspiring educators with hands-on apprenticeship training, whilst our own team will share knowledge of our curriculum and how we operate.

So far, we have been able to support 29 young people from around the Black Country, to develop their skills in early years education, with the view to offering employment on completion of their training.

ENABLING INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES TO THRIVE IN DUDLEY

Our Family & Youth Programme in Dudley's Wrens Nest is making a lasting impact. Co-produced with young people and families, Wren's Nest Navigators offers activities tailored to their needs, engaging 175 young people, 105 parents, and 6 volunteers this year.

Now in its fourth year of a fiveyear initiative funded by the National Lottery, the programme has built strong relationships, establishing YMCA as a trusted

Our team's dedication has enriched lives and built a collaborative network with partners, offering seamless referrals and services. By preventing service duplication and guiding residents to local authority resources, we've become a vital link for those who may lack trust in formal systems.

DEVELOPING BODY, MIND & SPIRIT IN SANDWELL

Through the newly funded Wider Determinants of Health (WDH) initiative in Sandwell. YMCA's Health and Wellbeing team is committed to promoting health equality and delivering early intervention and prevention activities to support healthier communities.

The programme offers a range of free activities designed to improve physical, mental and social well-being, including discounted gym memberships, coffee & craft sessions and mental health workshops covering topics such as stress, anxiety, and confidence-building. Additionally, participants can take part in health walks and cooking workshops.

Targeted at adults aged 18 and above, the program has already engaged over 100 individuals in its first eight months, with more than 80% reporting a positive impact on their health and wellbeing

This initiative strengthens YMCA's commitment to empowering individuals in mind, body, and spirit,

and plays a key role in building stronger, healthier communities in Sandwell.

EMPOWERING THE CITY'S **YOUNG PEOPLE**

Y's Youth in Wolverhampton has become a trusted program, offering weekly activities for young people, with expanded services during school holidays through the Holiday Activity Fund (HAF). This funding enables us to provide full-day sessions, including healthy meals, at no cost to families.

Over the past four years, we've built a strong reputation for culturally responsive programming that resonates with our diverse communities. During holidays, we engage over 70 young people daily, many of whom attend regularly.

Y's Youth offers not only recreational opportunities but also a positive, supportive space that makes a lasting impact on young people and the Wolverhampton community.

PERSONALISED SUPPORT FOR A FRESH START IN LIFE

Our housing continues to prove a vital service to our Black Country and Staffordshire communities. providing over 130,000 bed nights during 2023 to vulnerable young people and adults. Although local young people are the main focus of our work, over recent months YMCA has supported refugees from Ukraine, Syria and other war-torn countries.

Through our Open Door project,

term supported lodgings, YMCA has provided a safe home to 39 young people. Despite this, we are seeing a growing need for hosts as the numbers of teenagers who, often through no fault of their own, find themselves without housing is increasing.

A safe place to stay, backed up by the support of YMCA, helps these young people find out who they are and what they can become, developing their full potential, despite a difficult start to their adult life.

BUILDING ON THE BASICS TO SUPPORT INDEPENDENCE

The development of the George Williams Award, named after YMCA's founder, supports our residents with life skills to prepare them for independent life once they are ready to move on from YMCA. Offered to all Supported Housing residents, individuals work through a series of modules around budgeting, social skills and tenancy management. Each resident must complete all modules within the course to be fully prepared to move on into a private tenancy.

Each year, YMCA holds a celebration and award presentation for young people who have completed the course, to invite family and friends to celebrate their hard work whilst enjoying a three-course meal.

One young person said "Moving into a YMCA Project saved my life in

more ways than I can explain. It gave me the opportunity to move through the George Williams Award, to develop and further the skills that I'll need to move on from YMCA, in addition to supporting me to understand and deal with many issues from my past.

"I have been able to take control of my mental health, my education and my future in a way that would have been impossible, had I not moved into the project. I know that the experiences I've had at YMCA will only allow me to grow and thrive even further."

Many of the young people who have completed the George Williams Award, have either moved on successfully to independent accommodation or are waiting to be nominated through their local authority.

DEVELOPING PEOPLE TO REACH THEIR FULL POTENTIAL

YMCA's mentoring service offers tailored, 1-2-1 support for those that have barriers in accessing employment, education and training, to reach their full potential.

By co-producing action plans along with the mentee, YMCA mentors find this provides a more successful career path for young people, focusing on each individual holistically, to address and overcome whatever barriers they are facing.

Our team take a person-centred approach, working with people at different points in their journey at a pace that suits them and encourages them to thrive.

We are dedicated to helping individuals develop life and job skills, through CV workshops, building interview techniques and boosting confidence amongst our young people.

YOUTH HUB EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS TO TACKLE YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

The YMCA & Department for Work and Pensions (DWP)
Youth Hub in Sandwell has successfully completed its first year, surpassing all targets in supporting young people into employment and training. This remarkable achievement has been recognised across the Black Country, with the hub celebrated as an exemplar model.

DWP launched their Sandwell Youth Hub, in partnership with Sandwell Council and YMCA Black Country Group at our West Bromwich site in Carters Green. The Sandwell Youth Hub works with young people aged 18-24, who are referred by the Job Centre to overcome barriers they may be facing that are preventing them from accessing employment, training or education. Through dedicated efforts, the hub has provided invaluable resources,

guidance, and opportunities, empowering countless young individuals to secure jobs and enhance their skills.

Recently, DWP and
YMCA have partnered to develop
Umbrella Cafe, which takes
place next to the Youth Hub in
YMCA's Coffee at the Clock. The
Umbrella Cafe works to support
people with disabilities to engage
them in an informal setting,
with peer support and the DWP
Disability Employment adviser,
to address isolation, loneliness
and confidence building.

SIMPLE ACTS OF KINDNESS **MAKING A BIG DIFFERENCE IN WALSALL**

From our Small Street Centre in Walsall, our team are providing what, to many, could be seen as a simple service through completing forms and advising people how to navigate council websites. However, these services have proved life changing to those accessing it.

Our team ensure that those facing significant barriers in their life are

aware of the support available to them, through the benefits system and accessing local services, in addition to standing up for individuals who may not be able to do so themselves.

These services promote equality, justice and dignity, ensuring that everyone has a voice and the ability to make informed choices about their lives.

MAKING CONNECTIONS TO COMBAT LONELINESS

A friendly service for residents of all ages in Walsall, Making Connections aims to address loneliness, social isolation and to empower residents to take responsibility for their own health and well-being.

Our Social Connector will visit an individual, get to know them and understand their needs and aspirations and encourage them to seek out opportunities to get involved in local events or activities such as cooking classes, social walks or gardening clubs.

PROVIDING THE BASICS TO THE MOST VULNERABLE

The Glebe Centre offers vital support to vulnerable individuals living in the Walsall area, who are struggling with issues such as homelessness, substance misuse and poverty.

Support & Advice The Glebe Centre, which is open 10am - 4pm every weekday provides 2 hot meals, shower facilities. advice on accessina benefits and a safe place to socialise.

Service users often enjoy day trips in and around the Black Country and, aside from the physical benefits, our service users have the opportunity to connect and interact with each other in a different way outside of the centre. This is important in building a sense of belonging and self worth.

Our YMCA Chaplaincy team make weekly visits to offer spiritual support. Whilst most of their time is spent chatting about life experiences, sharing views and opinions, this offers service users a chance to enjoy a coffee and safe socialising with people they can trust and confide in.

OUR LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL CHRISTIAN MISSION

Christian Mission across YMCA Black Country Group has grown this year with the appointment of a Head of Christian Mission in September 2023 and a Chaplaincy Coordinator in July 2024, increasing the impact and scope of our Christian Mission significantly.

Internationally, we have contributed to the Christian in 2024, a YMCA conference which focuses on developing the 'C' in the work of YMCA.

On a National level, YMCA Black Country are part of a leadership team producing bespoke YMCA Chaplaincy Training, which we hope to launch next year for YMCAs in England & Wales, with the aim to equip Volunteer Christian Chaplains who serve in YMCA settings with the tools they need to support our service users in their faith journey.

Locally, we have partnered with St Andrew's Church in West Bromwich to host Christmas Nativity and Easter Services, which saw many staff and nursery families join in the festivities. For the first time ever, YMCA also hosted a Christmas event in all four Black Country boroughs, to enable more staff and service users to attend. Staff were sent daily email devotionals written by our Head of Christian Mission during advent and weekly devotionals during Lent which we were received with excellent feedback.

We are passionate about developing more partnerships with local churches and to that end, our Head of Christian Mission sits on the Core Team of a large network of churches called Love Black Country. Through this network YMCA has developed new church partnerships to support our housing staff and residents in Dudley, Walsall and Rugeley and we have sponsored the Love Black Country Together 2024 event to promote the work of YMCA Chaplains to over 2,500 Christians from across the area.

CARING FOR THE SPIRIT OF OUR COMMUNITY

Our Chaplaincy Service has been re-branded using the 'Talk It Out' slogan, to make it easier for staff and service users to understand

Christian what our Mission Chaplains do and engage with them. All paid and volunteer chaplains have their own uniform so that they are easy to identify within our community settings and a dedicated chaplaincy email address allows anyone to book a one-to-one appointment.

To support new residents, Chaplaincy Welcome Packs have been developed, introducing them to the chaplaincy service and explaining how they can access it; regardless of their personal beliefs and background. It provides residents with a safe place to talk and give them hope that they are not alone in their journey.

Our Early Years staff have received training in how to deliver age-appropriate activities that enable our children to explore the Christian faith as part of our 'Spirit' curriculum, such as a bespoke Advent calendar tool which shares the story of Christmas in a fun and engaging way to all pre-school aged children during December. Each nursery is visited regularly by our team, to enjoy Christian puppet shows and stories as part of their Stay and Play sessions throughout the year.



A LASTING LEGACY: YMCA 180 YEARS

In June, YMCA celebrated 180 years since it's founding in a small room in London, way back in 1844. YMCA Black Country's roots began several years later in West Bromwich in 1888 and so to honour our past and all YMCA has achieved in the Black Country, our community open day welcomed individuals from our past, such as Eric & Brenda Moore, who have served YMCA in some capacity for

over 70 years. We also celebrated the work of our current staff team, through developing youth work and safe, affordable accommodation for local young people.

To celebrate our legacy, YMCA has created the 180° Fund, designed to fund much needed youth provision in the Black Country, with the view to ensuring young people can turn around their lives before taking the wrong path.

Focusing on support from local businesses, our aim is to find 180 businesses to donate £180 to support our mission to empower the next generation and their future workforce.

Looking forward, YMCA is currently developing our strategy for the next 5 years and how we can shape services to continue our legacy in transforming communities so that all young people can truly belong, contribute and thrive.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING YOUNG PEOPLE CAN **ASPIRE TO**

Through our Y-Living model, YMCA provides young people with new, affordable housing with a trusted landlord. Aimed at young professionals aged from 18 to 35 or young people in full time education or training, Y-Living gives occupiers the opportunity to live in high quality accommodation, alongside like-minded individuals.

March 2024 saw the completion of our Y-Living accommodation in Hamstead, West Bromwich, which now provides an additional 26 safe and secure one-bedroom studio apartments and communal facilities.

Henrietha (pictured right) who is a nurse, moved into Y-Living after relocating from Kent for work. Henrietha said: "I was previously in a house share but it was a bad experience so when I was checking for homes to view, I was pleased to see there was a new build available from YMCA Black Country as I have always wanted to live in one. It is really clean, everyone respects

each other and the YMCA helped me with my application so I was really happy to be among the first to move in."

We know young people are still struggling to find suitable accommodation across the Black Country and we need to do more. We are excited to be working towards our next Y-Living development, 'YMCA @ the Dixon Building' in Wolverhampton.

Joining forces once more with our partners Morro, BPN, Homes England, WMCA and whg, YMCA aims to deliver an additional 30 units of accommodation to meet the housing needs of young people.

Future Developments

This development will not only deliver the safe, secure, supportive and affordable accommodation young people need, but it will also deliver a multi-use space, enabling us to engage the wider community in the services we deliver and meet our emerging strategic objectives to deliver safe, healthy, aspirational, protected and sustainable and engaged communities.


than could be achieved by any organisation working alone.
